## MARCH 25 FEAST: THE ANNUNCIATION



# Contemplate the Word of God and Delight in it

In many paintings of the Annunciation, our Blessed Mother is depicted reading or having an open book on her lap, as in Fra Angelico's frescoes or Rogier van der Weyden's paintings. What we see in the Blessed Mother is attentiveness to the word of God, which will become flesh in her womb: "And the Word became flesh, and dwelt among us" (John 1:14, RSV). On this feast of the Annunciation, we ought to take the time to consider our contemplative Blessed Mother, who was open to receiving the Word, and ask ourselves if we are open to receiving the Word in our hearts.

Aristotle tells us that the highest human action is contemplation, which is an act that leads man outside himself to contemplate the eternal and unchanging things. Contemplation is one of the ways that we are able to learn about God, but the Blessed Mother's act of contemplation is much deeper, because she contemplated the word of God day and night (Psalm 1:2). It is said that Mary knew the Scriptures so well that they took flesh in her womb in Christ. She "is like a tree planted by streams of water, that yields its fruit in its season, and its leaf does not wither" (Psalm 1:3). From the Blessed Mother came forth the shoot of Jesse (Isaiah 11:1), Jesus Christ, who came to save all men from sin. Because of the Blessed Mother's attentiveness to the Word, she conceived the Word so that He could bring salvation to all.

When the angel greets the Blessed Mother, "Hail, full of grace" (Luke 1:28), "she was greatly troubled at the saying, and considered in her mind what sort of greeting this might be" (Luke 1:29). Why is Mary troubled by this saying? She knows that this has never been said in the Scriptures before, and so she is troubled that the angel would come to her with such a greeting. Even still, she considers within herself what sort of greeting this might be: as Pope Benedict XVI comments, this points to "her inner engagement with the word." Mary is well aware of the prophecies concerning the Messiah, having contemplated the Scriptures so deeply. She is therefore ready, willing, and open to giving her response to the angel: "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word" (Luke 1:38). Mary accepts the word of the angel; she accepts the proclamation of God; she receives the Word of God into her heart, such that he becomes incarnate within her womb. As Benedict XVI further comments, "It is the moment of free, humble yet magnanimous obedience in which the loftiest choice of human freedom is made." In contrast with the disobedience of Adam and Eve, who did not ponder the word of God in their hearts and chose to turn away from God, Mary's act of contemplation leads her to obedience to the Word.

Each of us is called to contemplate the word of God and take delight in it, just like the man of Psalm 1. In the dictatorship of noise present in our culture, how often do we sit down to contemplate the word of God, so that we might take it wholly into our hearts and make our wills one with God's will? On this feast of the Annunciation, we should pray to our Blessed Mother, so that we might have the grace to receive the Word as she did, whatever our state of life might be. We are all called to receive the Word of God and keep it—"My mother and my brethren are those who hear the word of God and do it" —and if we do, then we will be made sons and daughters of God. If we keep the word of God, we will be imitating our Blessed Mother, who carried the Word of God beneath her heart; let us learn to imitate her that we might carry the Word of God in our own hearts.

March 24, 2019 Archbishop Miller: A Dear Parishioners,

Last week was a milestone in the history of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish. It was the occasion of Archbishop Michael Miller's Pastoral Visit in which he met a record number of parishioners, volunteers and staff. The visit was part of his plan to gain greater insight into the workings of all 79 parishes of the Archdiocese of Vancouver. It is indeed the first time a bishop has done such a thorough evaluation of all aspects of the financial, administrative, and spiritual life of this faith community as well as a survey of our church and its environs.

The 4-day visit began with meetings on Thursday evening, two days of back-to-back meetings on Friday and Saturday and closed with Sunday Eucharist. All in, I counted 28 meetings, 3 supper gatherings, 3 coffee meetings and 3 Masses. My estimate is that he met with 260 people including our big group of altar servers and school staff.

In his 9am Sunday Mass homily, the Archbishop said: "The past few days have been very busy as I was able to get together with volunteers from nearly every group and ministry that give life to your parish. During these meetings, I listened to all that you are doing, as well to your hopes for the future and the challenges you are facing. I also learned about the creative ways in which you carry out your ministries that I can share with other parishes when I visit them."

"This experience of meeting and talking with so many people who are engaged in the life of your parish family has been both inspiring and a cause of great hope for the future of the Catholic Church in Vancouver. You should be proud that with God's grace, your community is flourishing under the shepherding guidance of your beloved pastor, Fr Babu and his assistant Fr. Joseph, with the helping and steady hand of Fr. Bill."

Archbishop Miller, in his commentary on the Gospel of the Transfiguration, also mentioned it is important for us to "take the time every day to go up the mountain with Jesus... find a place of silence, a place of prayer, so as to hear his voice. Listen to him first of all in your heart but also listen to Jesus in his written Word in the Gospels. If you haven't made a Lenten resolution yet, think about reading one of the Gospels between now and Easter."

My dear friends, the endorsement of the Archbishop was indeed reassuring. No doubt, it is God's grace and the work of all our dedicated parishioners which makes all this possible. I would like to thank again all who made this visit such a fruitful one for us. We benefited tremendously from our conversations with the Archbishop. The ministry coordinators and I took notes as he shared his insights and suggestions. We will be receiving a fuller report from his office in a few months.

May our Blessed Mother help us co of our journey towards Easter.

Archbishop Michael Miller's visit to our parish was an occasion of joy and great excitement for OLPH ministry members and coordinators. Archbishop Miller remarked that he was very grateful for the warm hospitality and the efforts of those who made sacrifices to be present at meetings especially as it was the start of Spring Break.

In his homily at the 9am Mass with the whole parish, Archbishop Miller said there are three blessings we have as a parish family that he thought worthy of note.

#### **Redemptorist Charism**

"First of all, this is a parish where the Redemptorist charism which combines true devotion, especially to Our Lady and to the Lord's living presence in the Blessed Sacrament, with outreach and action in the world is present. Faith in action is evident here at OLPH. The newly formed Redemptorist Associates and the upcoming pilgrimage to places dear to them, as well as a deepening appreciation of the relevance of the spirituality of St Alphonsus mark your parish in a unique way."

### **Outstanding School**

"Secondly, you are blessed to have an outstanding school as an essential ministry within your parish. I say "within" your parish because it is not accurate to speak of the parish and the school as two separate institutions or communities. There are two buildings, a school and a church but the school is integral to the parish community. It is the *parish* school. Your school is flourishing because of the extraordinary way in which it is carrying its mission as an evangelizing community which is intentional in fostering in the students a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, a Catholic world view and a way of life patterned on the Gospel. I want to thank the Principal, Mrs. Clarke, the teachers and staff with whom I enjoyed a wonderful conversation. The Mass I celebrated on Friday morning with the children gave me ample proof, if any were needed, that you should be very proud of your Catholic school.

#### Sharing of Gifts and Talents

"Thirdly, it is certainly the Lord's work in your midst that so many of you are putting your gifts and talents at the service of other parishioners, as well as to a large number in the wider community, indeed even across the globe. The dedication of those who continue to serve year after year bears witness to your love for your parish."

After relating the list of all the committees and ministries he met, Archbishop Miller said: "What a grace-filled community you are! Continue to expand your ministries, inviting ever more parishioners to share in your work, especially those who are younger and not yet as fully involved as those who have found a home here for many years. How to welcome new members to your ministries and the need to plan for the future are both necessary to ensure a flourishing future."

He concluded his message by saying, "Dear friends, continue to live the teaching of Jesus in your blessed parish. Let us pray with gratitude for all that God has done for this parish family at OLPH and ask him to strengthen our resolve to live as disciples in a world which needs the light of Jesus and God's Word so that it will come to know the fullness of life our Saviour came to give us."
